CALL TO ORDER

Matt Woodrow, Board Chair, called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m.

Those in attendance were Board members Stephanie Helmig, Mark Chalbeck, Dana Buckley, and Kristina Ickes (6:04 p.m.). Also in attendance were Principal, Becky Wing, Assistant Principal, John Banks; Director of Student Services, Kathryn Duncan; Superintendent William (Bill) Rearick; Assistant Superintendent, Marge Polak; and Business Administrator, Amy Ransom.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Matt Woodrow led the attendees in the Pledge of Allegiance.

PROOF OF POSTING

Bill Rearick provided proof of posting.

PUBLIC INPUT

Mike Tossell (North Road) spoke to the Right to Freedom in Education Law and said that teachers should not instruct in an inappropriate or divisive manner. Matt Woodrow stated that Moore School teachers stick to academics.

James Baum (High St.) asked if the Moore School would keep with the same health protocols as last year amid new guidances, to which Matt Woodrow said this subject will be discussed later in the meeting as it is on the agenda.

MINUTES

Motion by Matt Woodrow, seconded by Dana Buckley, to approve the retreat minutes. With Stephanie Helmig abstaining, all others in favor, the motion carried.

Motion by Kristina Ickes, seconded by Matt Woodrow, to approve the July 1, 2021 meeting minutes, and the motion carried unanimously.

Motion by Matt Woodrow, seconded by Kristina Ickes, to approve the sealed, non-public meeting minutes of July 1, 2021, and the motion carried unanimously.

Motion by Matt Woodrow, seconded by Mark Chalbeck, to approve the July 22, 2021 meeting minutes, and the motion carried unanimously.

Motion by Matt Woodrow, seconded by Kristina Ickes, to approve the non-public meeting minutes of July 22, 2021, and the motion carried unanimously.

OLD BUSINESS**Snow Day/Remote Learning**

After some discussion on snow/cancellation days, motion by Dana Buckley, seconded by Mark Chalbeck, to approve the Superintendent's recommendation to enter into remote learning on the 6th day after 5 snow/cancellation days, and the motion carried unanimously.

Facilities Projects Update

Becky Wing summarized the ongoing and upcoming facilities projects. She stated that the only thing that won't be completed is the 2nd floor window replacements as there will need to be an abatement due to asbestos. Interior signage will be updated. She said the cause of the water leak was identified and that it has been repaired.

Reopening Plan Update

Bill Rearick stated that last year guidance was taken from a number of agencies, but that they relied most heavily on the New Hampshire Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) as they are the most local. He said that the most recent update from the DHHS was on July 22, and as of right now, masks will be optional everywhere but on the buses. Becky Wing added that the plan is for inclusion of more kids in school and described changes to close contact criteria. Ms. Wing said she is still waiting for clarification

from DHHS and will keep abreast of any changes in guidelines. Bill Rearick stated that masks are not optional on buses because of the CDC Order which mandates mask wearing on all conveyances (bus, train, etc.), and that the Moore School will not tolerate 'mask-shaming'.

Motion by Kristina Ickes, seconded by Dana Buckley, to approve the revised Reopening Plan for 2021/2022 as presented, and the motion carried unanimously.

NEW BUSINESS

Instructional Time Schedule

Becky Wing presented three options for the 2021/2022 Henry W. Moore School start times and explained each. She said she preferred the two options which allows for more purposeful and daily instructional time. Dana Buckley stated that, though he preferred all students arriving at once (as opposed to a staggered start time), he has heard from a number of parents concerned about not being able to drop of their children early and preferred the third option. Considerable discussion ensued. When asked if the New Morning Program would be available, Becky said it would be, if at least 15 families were interested. Motion by Matt Woodrow, seconded by Mark Chalbeck, to approve Option A of the Henry W. Moore School 2021/2022 Start Times as presented. With Dana Buckley opposed, all others in favor, the motion carried.

Becky Wing presented the Instructional Time Schedule which corresponded with the newly adopted start times.

Motion by Matt Woodrow, seconded by Mark Chalbeck, to approve the Instructional Time Schedule for 2021/2022 as presented, and the motion carried unanimously.

Handbook Changes

John Banks reviewed the changes to the handbook.

Motion by Dana Buckley, seconded by Mark Chalbeck, to approve the 2021/2022 handbook changes as presented, and the motion carried unanimously.

FINANCIAL

Motion by Mark Chalbeck, seconded by Stephanie Helmig, to approve the June 11, 2021 manifest in the amount of 442,667.38, and the motion carried unanimously.

Motion by Mark Chalbeck, seconded by Stephanie Helmig, to approve the June 14, 2021-July 9, 2021 manifest in the amount of 502,297.49, and the motion carried unanimously.

Motion by Mark Chalbeck, seconded by Stephanie Helmig, to approve the July 12, 2021-August 6, 2021 manifest in the amount of 162,806.20, and the motion carried unanimously.

PERSONNEL

Co-Curricular Nominations

Motion by Matt Woodrow, seconded by Dana Buckley, to approve the Co-Curricular nominations as presented, and the motion carried unanimously.

POLICIES

Motion by Dana Buckley, seconded by Stephanie Helmig, to approve the second reading/adoption of Policy JICK (Pupil Safety and Violence Prevention-Bullying) as presented, and the motion carried unanimously.

Matt Woodrow stated that he received an email from the Budget Committee and Select Board asking how much the school district is getting for COVID relief and how it will be spent. Matt explained that Candia didn't get much as it is based on free and reduced lunch numbers, but that those funds would pay for filter upgrades for the HVAC system.

Bill Rearick stated that he is unaware of anyone teaching or promoting Critical Race Theory, and if parents are concerned to contact Principal Wing.

PUBLIC INPUT

Kelly Espinola (Merrill Road) suggested that parents be notified immediately as to the change in the start time at HMS. She said it is the parent's responsibility to find before-school child care and it is the school's responsibility is for their education.

Mike Tossell thanked the Board for giving the option of wearing masks. He said people must stop doing what feels right and to do what evidence shows. He stressed that the Board be very clear with mask expectations if the situation changes.

Kristy Lawton (Merrill Road) stated she appreciated the same start times for all students and that it is the parent's responsibility to find child care for students before school.

Dana Buckley asked Bill Rearick what the reopening plan for Pinkerton was, to which Bill stated that he hasn't heard anything official yet.

Candia School Board Report

September 2, 2021

- On August 18th I held a professional development day for the SAU 15 principals and administrators. Attorneys from Drummond Woodsum provided an update on the changes that have been made to Title IX and to changes in the NH laws that pertain to student discipline.
- On August 19th I attended a virtual South Central Superintendent's meeting. The primary discussion was on how districts were addressing the issue of wearing masks at the start of the school year. Some districts were implementing mask wearing for all students, some were making masks optional, and one district, masks will be required for elementary aged students but optional for the middle and high school students.

Some superintendents mentioned that their Board meetings were very contentious over this issue. Others expressed frustration with DHHS's guidelines for the 2021-22 school year. They wanted DHHS to more definitive with their guidance.

- On August 25th, I performed a walkthrough at the Henry Moore School. Lynda and her team have done a great job in getting the school ready for the first day of school.
- I welcomed the teachers back to school on Monday, August 30th. It was the first time I was able to speak with the staff in person since September of 2019. I thanked the teachers for everything did for our students last year and wished them a safe and successful school year.

Facilities

Our custodial crew has done a fabulous job getting the building ready for the return of our staff and students. Completed summer projects include:

- Abatement and new floor tile in 3 rooms;
- Unit vent replacements & exhaust fans;
- Partial abatement, new flooring and sink in the art room;
- Window replacement in 4 classrooms, the staff room and media center;
- Emptying of all classrooms for top to bottom cleaning;
- Stripping and waxing of floors;
- Painting of many areas in need of a touch up;
- Relocation of some classrooms

We are awaiting the completion of the school zone lights, kindergarten playground, window shades, interior ADA signage, and additional window replacement.

Technology

Mr. Jamrog has been busy updating, cleaning and preparing the Chromebooks and chrome tablets for the upcoming school year. He has created new accounts for students and updated the rosters for all of our digital resources in preparation for the new school year. Throughout the summer key components for the network were upgraded to improve connectivity and reliability for students and staff.

Student Services

The student service department had a busy summer with a variety of extended school year programs running throughout July and August. We had great attendance this summer, and students in preschool through high school had a variety of meaningful experiences. We welcomed a new special educator, Kelly Jacques, to the Moore School. She came to us from Parker Varney School and has been a wonderful addition to our team. Team members within the Moore School participated in different professional development opportunities including targeted small group instruction, behavioral principles, and executive functioning. Additionally, there have been ongoing IEP team meetings for the students within the Moore School as well as students attending high schools, charter schools, pre-schools, and out of district schools.

Candia Reopening Plan Feedback

The following comments were submitted to the Candia School District website regarding the Candia Reopening Plan since the 8/5/21 update.

8/6/2021 18:12:26	I wish the school was at its old start time for all students of 750. The later start is challenging with work schedules.
8/6/2021 18:23:25	This model works for our family. Thank you.
8/10/2021 20:12:52	This plan made scene in June when it appeared the pandemic was nearing an end. With the rise in the delta variant and community transmission increasing it no longer makes sense. The American Academy of Pediatrics advises mandatory masking in schools. This age group is unable to receive vaccines at this time. It is the school's responsibility to provide a safe environment. Does Henry Moore school no longer care about our children? This proposal is ludicrously unsafe and appears to be based on politics not medicine. Revise.
8/11/2021 19:28:45	The virtually no mitigation strategy proposed here seems foolhardy and premature with the rise of the delta variant and increasing infections in young people. Henry Moore school did a great job last year keeping numbers low. Please return to that strategy for the beginning of the school year and modify when things are back under control. Candia's school children deserve more than to be sent to school with no mitigation. It is the schools responsibility to provide a safe environment. How does the school, in their role as in loco parentis, plan to ensure that children whose parents want them to wear a mask adhere to this? The APA states everyone in school regardless of vaccination status should wear a mask. Everyone. We all want this to be over. This non plan is not in our children's best interests. No masks, children elbow to elbow in the cafeteria, no quarantine for known exposures and potentially infectious volunteers in schools is unconscionable.
8/13/2021 7:33:01	As a pediatric nurse in our community as well as a parent I find this plan a great way to ensure that our precious children are exposed and become ill with Covid 19. I work with Dartmouth Hitchcock and see the numbers of cases in children growing by the day. This is a disease of the unvaccinated and the majority of the children in our school are unvaccinated. Children are getting sick and ending up hospitalized with long term effects


	<p>from Covid 19. It is proven that masking reduces community spread and protects both the one wearing the mask as well as others. I find it completely unacceptable to be disregarding this easy way to help protect our most precious things, our children. This current plan has taken away all of the safe guards that were in place last year, which did keep the numbers at bay. As a pediatric nurse, I can say with certainty that our children will get sick from Covid. If anything we can require masks to help slow the spread. At Dartmouth Hitchcock, over the winter, we saw a significant decline in other seasonal illnesses such as RSV, Croup and Influenza, which was attributed to the masking and social distancing that was in place. Now that those measures have been removed for the most part, those cases have begun to spike. This is evidence that masks work. I ask you not only as a nurse, but as a parent, please reinstitute the mask requirement at Henry W Moore School. Let's do what we can to keep our precious children and families safe.</p>
8/16/2021 7:21:53	<p>I highly disagree with the masks being an option for kids and teachers. Kids under 12 don't have the option of receiving the vaccine and our school and community should be doing everything they can to keep all kids safe. The numbers in our community are higher now than when we required masks. Many districts are requiring masks, and many have changed from optional to required as they have seen the increase in numbers across the state. I hope Candia will follow their lead to better keep our kids safe. Some will say well have your child learn remotely through the virtual online option. Why should we have to? I run a medical facility and am very aware of what mitigation measures actually help and I know the HVAC was upgraded but also is negligible in efforts to promote safety. The air exchange rates need to be at hospital levels to even think about lessening mask wearing and social distance. This is a new animal we are dealing with so we cant pretend the old safety measures are going to be able to keep our children safe. I do truly appreciate all of the staff and the efforts over the course of this pandemic but I do want you all to reconsider not implementing mask wearing.</p>

To listen to the school board meeting and to hear someone actually say there is no science that masks work is appalling. Some parents are already so fearful of kids all congregating in school and now with the new variant affecting the younger population this seems like we would want to make sure our unvaccinated children are all protected and safe. I can say with certainty that I do not feel safe putting my child in school, but unfortunately do not have an alternative. 8/26/2021 18:32:06	<p>I am writing to you tonight as we are a week away from our kids going back to school for the 21/22 year. I just wanted to make some comments about the reopening plan. It was my</p>

understanding that if we got to substantial or high community transmission that the reopening plan would move to the next level of protection for our children. As I read it we are not doing so. We are at a point where we could use to our advantage the lessons of our southern states actions and decisions. Last week there were 180,000 new pediatric cases of covid. Many southern states have decided to ignore science and leave it up to parents to decide about masking. This is not playing out well as many states currently have no pediatric ICU beds in their hospitals with a direct correlation to these decisions. Masking only works if everyone wears them. This is not last year's covid 19, this delta variant is at least as transmissible as chickenpox. Every person infected can transmit to 9 people instead of 1 to 2. I would ask the school board to imagine that their kids were in the situation where they are in an ICU bed and their parents can't even be there with them. I am in the healthcare field and wear a mask 8 to 10 hours a day. No one wants wear a mask all day but sometimes you have to do things not just because you want to but because it is the right thing to do. I feel as a parent and would hope as an elected representative of our children you could recognize that at this point the best protection against covid is masking. Personal opinion and rights end where public health begins. I would like to thank the teachers and administration, specifically Ms Wing, for all of their efforts throughout this pandemic. Our children are lucky to live here and benefit from their dedication. Please keep our children safe thank you
